LAKE ANDES, South Dakota, April 7th, 1925--The board of county commissioners reconvened as per adjournment of the forenoon session, and met for the consideration of petitions which had been filed with the county auditor concerning the division of certain school districts in Charles Mix county.

The county superintendent was called to the meeting to act with the commissioners on said petitions.

The first petition taken up was to change the boundaries of Highland School District No. 2 and Lawrence School District No. 2. After some consideration by the board and county superintendent by a unanimous vote it was laid aside until later on in the session.

The next matter taken up was the division of Bryan township school district. Petitions were presented to the board and after careful checking it was found that there was not enough legal voters on the petitions to warrant a change at this time, so a motion was made by McBride and seconded by Baxa that they be rejected. On roll call all members voted "aye", McBride, Meyerink, Baxa and Myrtle B. Rufing.

The Highland School District No. 2 and Lawrence School District No. 2 was again brought up for hearing. The petition as filed was for Highland School District No. 2 to comprise Sections 14, 15, 22, 23, 24, and NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 21 and all of Section 13, except the east one-half of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ thereof, all being in township 95 north of range 64, and the boundaries of said Lawrence School District No. 2 should comprise the west $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 4, all of sections 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 16, 17, 18, all of township 95, north of range 63 and the East $\frac{1}{2}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of section 13, in township 95 north of range 64. After due consideration by the board a motion was made by McBride and seconded by Baxa that the petition be granted as filed with the County Auditor. On roll call all members voting "aye."

The board then adjourned on school matters and reconvened for a general line of business.

The petition of Sylvester Eisenman of Marty, Charles Mix county, to exempt certain tracts of land from taxation in Wahehe, Highland and White Swan township was the next in order. 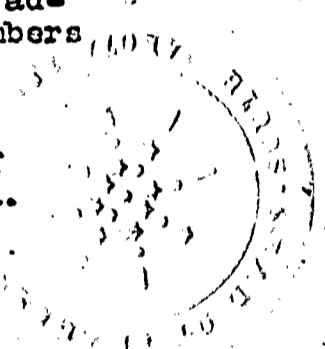

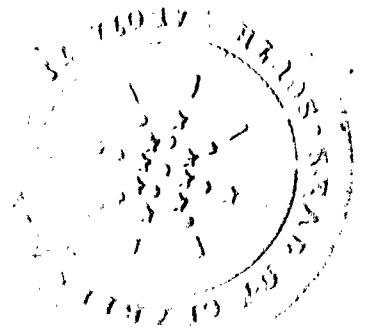
